Leon Segears, Class of 1972 and Vice President of the McKinley Tech Alumni Association (MTAA), sent this message on some guidance to stay vigilant and avoid being a victim wherever you live:

- * Plan your trip ahead of time and know which route to take. Avoid high crime areas.
- * Keep your vehicle well-maintained and with a full tank of gas.
- * Keep your doors and windows locked.
- * Have a charged cell phone handy.
- * Travel on well-lit and well-traveled streets and roads.
- * Travel with another person if possible.
- * Travel in the center lane.
- * Be aware of people around your car when stopped for a red light or stop sign. Do not put your window down for people asking for directions or money. Be ready to speed away if necessary.
- * If a person asks for help, do not leave your car. Use your cell phone to call 911.
- * Park your car in a well-lit and populated area.
- * When parking, look around for suspicious persons on foot nearby. If you see a suspicious person or persons, pull your car out of the parking space and leave the area.

The above guidance applies especially when driving up to an automated teller machine.

If you have been lightly rear-ended by another car on the road and do not feel safe, drive away and call the police on your cell phone. Drive to the nearest gas station or police station.

personal information, like your Social Security, bank account, or credit card numbers.

If you get an email or text message from a company you do business with and you think it's real, it's still best not to click on any links. Instead, contact them using a website you know is trustworthy. Or look up their phone number. Don't call a number they gave you or the number from your caller ID.

Resist the pressure to act immediately.

Legitimate businesses will give you time to make a decision. Anyone who pressures you to pay or give them your personal information is a scammer.

Know how scammers tell you to pay.

Never pay someone who insists you pay with a gift card or by using a money transfer service. And never deposit a check and send money back to someone.

Stop and talk to someone you trust.

Before you do anything else, tell someone — a friend, a family member, a neighbor — what happened. Talking about it could help you realize it's a scam.

How to Avoid a Scam



Four Signs That It's a Scam

Scammers PRETEND to be from an organization you know.

Scammers often pretend to be contacting you on behalf of the government. They might use a real name, like the Social Security Administration, the IRS, or Medicare, or make up a name that sounds official. Some pretend to be from a business you know, like a utility company, a tech company, or even a charity asking for donations.



They use technology to change the phone number that appears on your caller ID. So the name and number you see might not be real.

Scammers say there's a PROBLEM or a PRIZE.

They might say you're in trouble with the government. Or you owe money. Or someone in your family had an emergency. Or that there's a virus on your computer.

Some scammers say there's a problem with one of your accounts and that you need to verify some information.



Others will lie and say you won money in a lottery or sweepstakes but have to pay a fee to get it.

Scammers PRESSURE you to act immediately.

Scammers want you to act before you have time to think. If you're on the phone, they might tell you not to hang up so you can't check out their story.



They might threaten to arrest you, sue you, take away your driver's or business license, or deport you. They might say your computer is about to be corrupted.

Scammers tell you to PAY in a specific way.

They often insist that you pay by sending money through a money



transfer company or by putting money on a gift card and then giving them the number on the back. Some will send you a check (that will later turn out to be fake), tell you to deposit it, and then send them money.

What You Can Do to Avoid a Scam

Block unwanted calls and text messages.

Take steps to block unwanted calls and to filter unwanted text messages.

Don't give your personal or financial information in response to a request that you didn't expect.

Legitimate organizations won't call, email, or text to ask for your
